2020 is the Year of the Rat according to Chinese zodiac. The Year is starting from January 25th and lasting to 2021 February 11th. Rat is the first in the 12-year cycle of Chinese zodiac. MINISTRY WITH THE MIGRANTS IN HONG KONG

Fr. Jun Jacobe, OMI for last ten years has been serving migrants and working as a prison chaplain in Hong Kong. This is his sharing.

My current interest in working with the Migrant workers dated back to my theological studies in Rome in 1980. Aside from doing catechetical apostolate in the Oblate Parish preparing young people for Confirmation, I was also involved with the Filipino Migrant workers teaching them liturgical songs and assisting at Mass. When I was going back to the Philippines for my Diaconal Ordination, I passed by Hong Kong which was then still part of the Oblate Philippine Province and visited the Diocesan Pastoral Centre for Filipino Migrants. An RGS Sister who was the Directress gave me an orientation of the ministry servicing 230,000 mostly domestic helpers. Receiving them at the Centre on their day off and giving them various lectures about the Catholic faith, celebration of the Eucharist and topics related to their work. This created a mark in my heart so that after I was ordained a priest in 1984, I wrote to Fr. General for my first Obedience to return to Hong Kong and do this ministry.

It was only in 2010 that the Provincial of the Philippine Province granted my request to work "on loan for 3 years" with the Delegation of China to the Migrants in Hong Kong while doing Parish Ministry for the English-Speaking Community such as St. Jerome Parish and St. Alfred Parish. After 3 years, I wrote to the Delegation Superior of China and the Provincial of Australia to accept my intention to be part of the Delegation of China Mission which was approved.

Currently my work with the Migrants consists of the following:

- 1) Spiritual Director at the Diocesan Pastoral Centre for Filipino Migrants. I celebrate Mass on weekdays, Confession, give spiritual talks, recollection and baptism on a case to case basis, Counseling and blessings of houses/offices, stores by request. I am also available to fill in for mass whenever the priest assigned is not available.
- 2) Spiritual Director of the Pope's Prayer Network known as the Apostleship of Prayer for the English-Speaking Community in Hong Kong. The purpose of this group is to assist the Pope in praying for the monthly intention of the Pope each month throughout the year. I meet with the Lay Council Officers and 7 Centre Officers spread out in various Parishes in Hong Kong. The highlight of their activities consist of the Annual World Anniversary Gathering of both Chinese and English Speaking AP's of Hong Kong, usually first Sunday of December; the Feast of the Sacred Heart and the Feast of Christ the King. Monthly meetings are held in the different Centres.



3) Prison Chaplaincy. I am one of the Chaplain assigned by the Diocese of Hong Kong for Lo Wu Correctional (Women) and Stanley Correctional (Men). I conduct monthly visit to the Filipinos and inmates assigned to me by the Welfare Officer of both institutions. A consultation room is assigned to me and I listen to various stories shared by each inmate. When possible, I communicate with their families in the Philippines to brief them of the situation of their family member or relative inside the correctional institution. I also join the Philippine Consulate in their Annual Christmas visit of these two institutions.



4) Parish Invitations and Philippine Consulate in Hong Kong. Because of the shortage of priests to celebrate Mass especially on Sunday when the majority of Filipino workers have their day off, I also help at St. Joseph Church (Central), St. Teresa Church (Prince Edward), Holy Rosary Church (Pok Fu Lam), Mother of Good Counsel (San Po Kong) and Mass Centre at Holy Spirit (Ho Man Tin) and St. Jude (Yuen Long). Annually, I get invited to conduct Lenten and Advent Recollections for various groups in the parishes. During the summer, I serve as substitute priest for the Catholic Centre Chapel in Central while the priest assigned is on summer vacation.

Working with the Migrants is a challenging ministry. But I am happy that my previous ministries in the Philippines (School Administration and Formation) prepared me for this work. I thank the Delegation of China for allowing me to do this ministry as our response to the OMI Chapter recommendations. Fr. Jun Jacobe, OMI

LIVING IN CHINA - A LIFE CHANGING EXPERIENCE

In the past months the Oblate community in Beijing was enriched by the presence of two young volunteers from abroad: Luke Chow from Hong Kong (vocational discernment) and Justino Kim, a young scholastic from Korea. Below Justino is sharing his experience of living in China and Luke tells us about Christmas in Beijing.

Living in China was an amazing and life changing experience, which totally turn around my point of view of China. I, like most Koreans, had strong prejudice against China and its culture. However, after living for a while in the country, my negative thoughts which was so strong even to the point of dislike had totally changed. Let me share with you of some of the reasons of such dramatic change of heart.

First of all, I thought China was dirty and a messy place. The image of China I had before arriving was so negative, imaging trash and crimes all over the place. To my surprise after arrival I noticed clean and well-organized streets.

Secondly, people I met were so kind, generous and ready to offer help anytime I was in need. I didn't feel like I was in a foreign country. They were always asking me if I need





something, and offering assistance even when I didn't ask for it. Truly, I cannot forget constant kindness and warmness of the people I met.

Finally, I learned so much from our Oblate community in Beijing. Before going to China, I was aware that it is very difficult for religious people to minister in China. But after witnessing with my own eyes what they have to face and experience, I was so impressed. It had a massive impact on my faith which I have to confess was weakening at that particular time. Despite great difficulties, oblates and other religious try to deal with it with wisdom and continue to give witness to their faith.

I am really grateful to God for protecting our community in Beijing and oblates who are having difficulties and making every effort in persevering to keep spreading the Christian faith not in just mere words, but in action.

I visited various places and met so many people. I really thank God who granted me this opportunity of meeting our Oblate community in Beijing. Everyone was so kind and open-hearted toward me, who is still very new in the oblate way of life and oblate world in general. I really hope to have an opportunity to visit them again and to stay with such caring and generous people who helped me to have such a beautiful experience, which I will never forget in my entire life.
