I was privileged to have had Fr Austin as my Rector in the Seminary in the early eighties and as a member of my community here in Camberwell for the last years. I am grateful for his friendship, guidance, and especially his help with the ministry of MAMI. His dedication to the Eucharist and prayers have been a support for our work, especially our commitment to pray for the dead and the many special intentions we receive. His influence and wisdom will never fade, and our thanks will never be enough. Of course, his advice would be to thank God for what God has been able to accomplish in his life.

On the weekend of the 21st and 22nd of October Fr Mathew Raj and Fr Christian Fini, our Provincial, celebrated the Masses in the Parish of Lesmurdie in Western Australia. The Parish had originally been an Oblate ministry but had been returned to the care of the Archdiocese of Perth many years ago. Fr Mathew will live in community at the nearby Mazenod College and take on the role of Parish Priest of Lesmurdie. We are grateful

to the Archbishop for offering us this ministry and thank the parishioners for their enthusiastic welcome. It is wonderful to be able to welcome them back to the Family!

There is still much else to be grateful for. The work done by the young men in Mazenod College in Victoria and Iona College in Brisbane on their respective MADs (Mission Action Days) has not only raised large sums of money but more importantly has shown them that they can make a difference.

Bangladesh

Greetings to you in the Lord! Hope you are keeping fine. We are doing well. This is to share with you on the project of rearing cows and pigs for our sustainability with your grant of USD 7000. You will be pleased to know that with that money we were able to repair the cowshed and the piggery. We were able to purchase 5 cows and 20 piglets. They are growing well, and we hope to make some profit when we sell them. In three months, we were able to receive a profit of 300 USD from selling two cows. We hope to buy a few more calves from the profit and increase the number of cows. However, we were not selling the pigs yet as they must grow more.

We sincerely thank you for your generous contribution and cooperation towards our self-sustainability. Be assured of our prayers and God bless you!

WE REMEMBER

Fr Austin Cooper OMI

It is with great sadness that the Australian Province of the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate announces the death of Fr Austin Patrick Cooper OMI, in Melbourne on 2nd July 2023.



Austin Cooper was born on January 14, 1931, in Sorrento, Victoria. He attended Assumption College, Kilmore, and joined the Oblates in March 1950. He was sent to Kildalton Abbey, Piltown, Ireland to study and was ordained there on 16 September 1956.

On arrival back in Australia he worked in Brisbane while attending the University of Queensland (BA Hons in history), followed by Iona College in its second year. He was nominated as the first rector for the future St Mary's Oblate Seminary and went to study in Washington DC in 1961 to 62 to prepare for this ministry. While there he completed an MA in History at the Catholic University of America, and he later completed his PhD on the Oxford Movement at Monash University (1972).

As the founding Rector of St Mary's Seminary, Mulgrave from 1963 to 73, he established a close relationship with the nearby Monash University and combined the traditional training in philosophy with a university degree.

Fr Cooper served as the Australia Provincial from 1976 to 1983.

He then continued his significant and influential academic career: Foundation Master, Catholic Theological College, Melbourne, 1972-76; Vice-President of Melbourne College of Divinity, 1974-76; President of Melbourne College of Divinity, 1976-78. He has been a lecturer at CTC since 1972, including two further stints as Master, from 1992-94 and then again from 1998-2002. He was a Professor in the Department of Church History at CTC until 2022 and led overseas study tours as part of his courses in Christian Spirituality. His areas of expertise include Julian of Norwich and Cardinal Newman.

His writings include the history of the Australian Oblates up to 1994, 'A Little By Ourselves'; books on Julian of Norwich, 'The Cloud of Unknowing, and John Henry Newman, 'A Developing Spirituality' (2012).

In 2004 Fr Austin received the Order of Australia for services to Theological Education.

Fr Austin has been an outstanding priest and dedicated Oblate of Mary Immaculate. He was highly capable as well as being a man of prayer and deep spirituality.

He was influential in the human and spiritual formation of many Oblates, Lay people, Religious and Priests in Australia. In his 72 years as an Oblate, he was a pillar of the Australian Province and will be greatly missed. He was buried at Springvale on 12 July following a Requiem Mass at St John Vianney's Mulgrave attended by around 60 Priests, 2 Archbishops, and 5 Bishops.

AROUND THE MISSIONS

Kenya

'A middle-aged, privileged white guy goes to Kenya'.

Firstly, I need to thank the people of Cannon Hill Catholic Parish and the Oblates of Mary Immaculate for their support of this crazy idea I had. It started with a question during an Alpha course, "How Can I Make the Most of the Rest of My Life?" I started thinking about what I had to share and how to share it. Sure, I volunteer around the church, and I have a World Vision child but what else can I do? And what skills do I have? My skill set is in Electro-Mechanical Engineering and IT, not very useful "volunteering" skills but I wanted to do something more than just sponsor, I wanted to go and do it!

I spoke to my Parish Priest Fr Basti about my desire to go overseas to a place in need and volunteer my skills, all the time thinking, "These places need people to build dwellings or dig wells for water, who needs an IT guy?" Fr Basti gave me two options of places that could use me, Indonesia and Kenya. Kenya seemed about as far away as I could go so, I reached out to Fr Gerry and started to plan, and it was agreed that I would come to Kenya for 4 weeks to teach IT skills whilst fixing computers and IT systems.

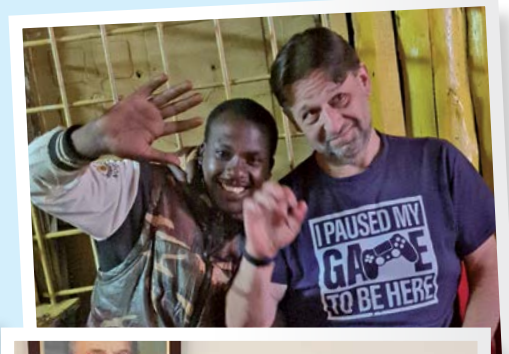
I was based in Karen, a suburb of Nairobi (the capital of Kenya), staying at Karen Hospitality & Admin Centre which also had a contingent of Pre-Novices to whom I taught 'Excel' skills. From day one I was working on laptops for the priests and the Pre-novice students to use in their studies, but I also got out and about seeing all the amazing work the OMI were doing in Kenya. Mere hours after getting off the plane I was at a Mass held at the Nyumbani Orphanage. Later that week I was invited by Tommy Nyawir, Founder of 'Mirror of Hope', to see the work his foundation is doing in the Kibera Slum. The foundation organises sponsors for talented students to receive funding for high school and university. State Sponsored schooling ends with primary school so students from places like slums rarely get an opportunity to go to high school let alone University. I was invited to present a talk on "Hope" and "paying it forward" to the students that ran overtime due to the student's interest.



Most of what I did do was with very limited resources as most of the IT equipment I worked on would have been thrown away long ago in the Western world. I upgraded what I could with more RAM or bigger/faster hard disks, and thanks to the financial support I received I was able to buy needed IT infrastructure.

I left Kenya feeling I could have done so much more and wishing I had more time (and money for IT gear). I feel like I had only started scratching the surface of what I could offer but I had a very rewarding experience, I made some new friends and hopefully helped some people.

All the OMI priests in Kenya were very keen to meet me and for me to experience the work they do in Kenya. I visited parishes in Kionyo, Meru, and Kisaju. I spent a week at the Kisaju Postulancy teaching Microsoft Office, general IT skills and fixing old IT equipment. Kisaju is (how my wife described it) the "World Vision Postcard" part of Kenya, it is very basic, dry, and dusty. It is largely a traditional Maasai people area of Kenya. Unfortunately, I only had time to spend a couple of days in Kionyo, a beautiful mountain area near Mt Kenya surrounded by Tea Plantations and Meru where they are building a new church.



The work the OMI are doing in Kenya is excellent, and it's refreshing to see the Church expanding instead of slowly dying like it is doing in the Western world. The priests are passionate about the work they do, they are engaged in their communities and are building new churches and infrastructure for those communities. The Kenya OMI have several outreach programs and an active and engaged youth group that volunteers at places like 'Mathare Slum' with a food program.



St Mary's Seminary

Greetings from St Mary's Scholasticate!

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all MAMI members for your continued prayer and support for the formation community here at St Mary's. Currently, all brothers are busily working on their assignments and preparing for end-of-semester exams as the academic year of 2023 concludes. Here are some updates on our second semester:

Fr Andrew, Rector, returned after his sabbatical leave before the beginning of the second semester in July. During his sabbatical, Fr Andrew had the opportunity to visit Oblates in Vietnam and spend a few days with the scholastics in Ho Chi Minh City. It was heartwarming to see more than 40 young men in Formation for the Oblate mission. We pray that some of them may be missionaries in Australia in the future.

Two significant components of the sabbatical were participation in a pilgrimage of Marian Shrines in Europe and a 4-week course on the Holy Land at the 'Tantur Ecumenical Institute'. Fr Andrew was inspired by the faith of so many pilgrims from all over the world visiting shrines such as 'Our Lady of Fatima', 'Our Lady of Lourdes', 'La Salette', and 'Our Lady of Czestochowa'. The immersion in the Biblical world has opened the Fifth Gospel, giving Fr Andrew fresh insight into the world that Jesus lived and walked. He is very grateful for this opportunity. Special thanks go to Fr Daniel Szwec, who, on top of his parish duty, was overseeing the formation community in Fr Andrew's absence.

It was my involvement with the Oblates' work since then that I gradually realized God's call to me to deepen my relationship with him by following the footsteps of St. Eugene de Mazenod to become a missionary. After completing my pre-novitiate in Hong Kong in 2019, I was sent to Cotabato in the southern Philippines to join the novitiate programme. In May of the following year, I professed my first vows. I stayed with the Oblate scholasticate of the Philippine Province in Quezon City for the next three years as I studied philosophy and theology. I arrived in Melbourne in August this year to join the community of St. Mary's Scholasticate and continue my post-novitiate formation and in the Catholic Theological College theological studies for the next couple of years.



From rural areas in the tropical Philippines to international communities to challenges during the COVID pandemic, formation experiences have been exciting for me to say the least. Languages, cultures, community life, brotherhood, and friendship are all solid sources of joy and difficulties through which this journey helps me grow as a person and as a religious. And I am equally thrilled to be in Australia and experience another face of the Oblate mission here. Religious life aside, I studied and worked professionally in the field of contemporary art prior to my religious formation. Though not being a very good athlete myself, I have huge interests in soccer and rugby union."

Also, we have Fr Marco who joined our community recently. Fr Marco is originally from Madagascar and has volunteered for the Australia mission. Currently, he is undertaking an English course.

World Youth Day

On the 20th of July, a group of 15 members from 'Oblate Youth Australia' embarked on a pilgrimage to Lisbon to be part of the World Youth Day 2023 Celebrations.

Beginning our pilgrimage in Bethlehem, we then travelled throughout the Holy Land following the footsteps of Jesus. One of the highlights of our time in the Holy Land was getting to say Mass on the Sea of Galilee in an old fishing boat. The last day was spent in Jerusalem walking the 'Via Dolorosa' before entering the 'Church of the Holy Sepulchre' – another deeply moving and spiritual experience that none of us will ever forget.

We then continued to the next part of our pilgrimage, World Youth Day week in Lisbon, Portugal. Our first day was spent exploring Fatima before the chaos of World Youth Day week began. It was wonderful to see so many young people coming together to proudly share their faith. There are many highlights of our time in Lisbon, but one in particular was the International Oblate Youth Gathering.

Our last international gathering of young people was at World Youth Day in Poland, 2016 and even though almost 7 years have passed since then, it was fantastic to see old



friends reunited. It was also wonderful to witness those who have never been to an international 'Oblate Youth Encounter meet' and get to know other young members of the De Mazenod Family. It was especially wonderful for our group as we were able to connect with the China Mission Pilgrimage group from Hong Kong which is also part of the Australian Province. The highlight of the event was the address from the Superior General Fr Chicho. It was a powerful moment of prayer and reflection as we listened to Fr Chicho reflect on the theme from the General Chapter: 'Pilgrims of Hope in Communion'. Fr Chicho challenged us to walk with God just as Mary did, to be Sowers of hope by placing ourselves at the service of the poor and to continue to be in communion with the Church and with God. We ended this powerful moment of prayer and reflection by being blessed by our founder St Eugene's cross and being told to go be 'Superior Generals' in our communities.

Soon enough it was time to leave Lisbon and head to our final destination on our pilgrimage, Aix-En-Provence, France. Our first stop was Marseille where we were lucky enough to have Mass at the tomb of our founder, St Eugene de Mazenod.



We then spent our final days in Aix-En-Provence, visiting the foundation house and walking in the footsteps of St Eugene. We were also lucky enough to reunite with the group from Hong Kong and share mass in the Church of the Mission before lunch with the Oblates at Foundation House.

We'd like to thank everyone who supported us whether it be through fundraising or prayers, we know this pilgrimage would not have been possible without the support of the entire De Mazenod Family.

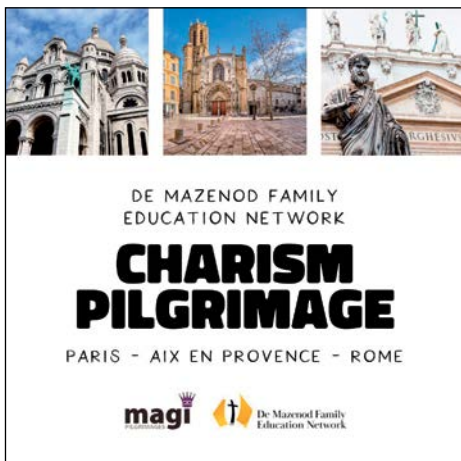
