When I first wrote to you as a newly appointed Provincial, in early 2019, I was filled with a great sense of excitement and expectation, having just celebrated the blessing and opening of the new St Mary's Seminary and preparing to celebrate the 125th Anniversary Celebrations of the Oblates arriving in Australia, along with the De Mazenod Family launch.

The Provincial Council and I had spent a considerable amount of time in 2019 listening and consulting with members of the Province to develop from the Province Mission and Vision Statement five achievable priorities for the last three years which were – a program of Province Visitation, relaunch, and significant investment in the De Mazenod Family, Vocations, Ongoing Formation and Ministry with Youth.

Little did we know what was waiting for us in 2020 and 2021, which would effectively change all our lives. The world pandemic, caused by an invisible virus, stopped all our plans in its tracks and challenged each of us to examine how we were missioning and discover new ways to be Parishes, Colleges, Oblate Youth Australia, Rosies, De Mazenod Family, and a Province.

We have been blessed to be comparatively unharmed from the direct effects of the virus here in Australia. However, the collateral damage has impacted all our lives; many special moments, celebrations of life have come and gone without the appropriate celebration or occasion to mark them.

Even from an economic perspective once again Australia for the most part has done well. The introduction of JobKeeper was a fairy-tale for most around the world but salvation for many here. In 2020 and 2021, even though we were not able to make Parish Appeals, you as MAMI supporters continued to be generous and made it possible for us to directly impact the lives of thousands of people in our region and beyond. With the economic effects impacting the poor, well before the health impacts, we quickly moved our funding model from projects to emergency aid. You helped to provide food and medical supplies to Oblates working with the poor in Bangladesh, India, Indonesia, Thailand, Bolivia, South Africa, Pakistan,



Sri Lanka, Madagascar, and Haiti; for the most part, you helped to feed thousands of people. Thank you for your generosity.

Despite the challenges over the last three years, we have much to be grateful for and to celebrate. Br Dominic Fung OMI celebrated his Perpetual Vows, our first Hong Kong vocation since the Oblates arrived in 1966. In Australia, after a long wait and a couple of reschedules, it was with great joy that we celebrated as a Province the Perpetual Vows of Br Joshua Nash and Br Luan Ha at St David's Tea Tree Gully SA in November and Br Joshua's Ordination to the Diaconate at St John Vianney's Vic in December. These celebrations fill us with iov that young men continue to respond to God's call and remind us that we need to invite men personally to consider a vocation to the Oblates.

The De Mazenod Family has been established and several programs have been run online, including two national gatherings. Our website provides many resources and opportunities,

Having been re-appointed Provincial for a second term of three years, I can assure you the excitement, passion, and enthusiasm for the Mission remains, along with a degree of uncertainty and anxiety as we navigate the omicron outbreak.


I envisage the De Mazenod Family to be a significant focus to assist us in deepening and strengthening our community experience in the Australian Province and recovering from the experience of the last two years.

Mother Teresa thought for a moment: "If I take the fifty cents, he will have nothing to eat tonight, and if I don't take it, I will hurt his feelings. So, I put out my hands and I took the money. I have never seen such a joy on anybody's face as I saw on the face of that beggar man at the thought that he too could give to Mother Teresa". Mother Teresa went on: "It was a big sacrifice for that poor man who had sat in the sun all day long and received only fifty cents. It was beautiful. Fifty cents are such a small amount, and I can get nothing with it, but as he gave it up and I took it, it became like thousands because it was given with so much love. God looks, not at the amount of money but at the love with which it is given". As St Francis of Assisi says, "For it is in giving that we receive". You are one of those people who offer your love and support to those who are in need during these difficult times.

Even during the pandemic, we have continued to support the work of our Oblates serving the poor around the world through spiritual and humanitarian works – feeding the hungry, caring for the sick, clothing the naked, and bringing the love of God to those in need. # 60th Ordination Anniversary of Fr Anthony Joseph Colbert OMI



Tony Colbert was born on 5 April 1937 in Nedlands, Perth, one of eight children and was educated at CBC Perth; he later attended the Oblate Juniorate in Lovely Banks, Vic. He joined the Oblates on 16 March 1954

at Sorrento and studied at Cedara, South Africa from 1955–1961 along with Bernie O'Brien, Vincent McGillicuddy, Kevin Casey, and later, John Sherman.



Fr Tony was ordained on 16th December 1961, at Fremantle.

His first obedience was to Iona College, followed by assisting at Hillcrest, Fremantle, and 3 years at Sefton. In 1970 he went to Massey NZ as an assistant then parish priest before returning to Victoria in 1976, first to Moe, assisting, followed by parish priest at Sorrento. He spent three years at Dernancourt, a further 5 years at Moe, and a year at Eagle Vale (all as an assistant) before settling at Fremantle in 1994 as hospital/prison chaplain, where he served until 2020.

He is currently mostly retired, living at Fremantle.

Fr Tony is a kind and generous priest; nothing is too much trouble, and he is a man of great patience. As a chaplain, he engages with people, brings comfort

and healing, and is interested in them. He is great company, with a wonderful sense of humour; he has gentlemanly manners, is knowledgeable and affable. He is a prayerful priest and a resilient one.

## Final Profession and Diaconate Ordination of Br Joshua Nash OMI

My story started some 30 years ago, when, as a baby, my parents brought me to be baptised at St David's. My parents, my extended family, and my parish community instilled in me the values of our Catholic faith. I am particularly indebted to the Antioch youth group at Tea Tree Gully and Oblate Youth Australia for providing me the space I needed as a teenager and young adult, to understand more about my faith, to claim my faith as my own, and to journey deeper into that faith. To be honest,





It wasn't until I travelled to Brazil for the 2013 World Youth Day that I had a profound experience of Christ calling me to help him rebuild his Church; a Church which I knew and loved, but a Church that was wounded

for the United Nations High Commissioner

for Refugees (UNHCR), I travelled to every

continent of the world (except Antarctica).

But there was always something missing...

and divided. I was inspired by the Oblate priests I had known growing up at St David's and who I worked closely with in Oblate Youth Australia. The charism of St Eugene de Mazenod spoke to me and after a year's discernment, I knew deep in my heart that I was destined to be an Oblate priest.

I have since completed my novitiate in the United States, undergone several years of seminary formation, and had the great opportunity to work in the Oblate missions in Lourdes and London. Now, as I prepare for my priestly ordination, I feel that I am standing at the precipice. I stand with the story of my family, my community, my formation behind me. Not forgotten, their presence is strong and supports me. What is in front of me I don't exactly know? But it will be a lifetime of bringing to fulfillment the vocation to which Christ has called me; that is to bring the Good News to the poor and the most abandoned. That is what an Oblate does, with the grace of God and the support of his brothers. This is what I have dedicated my life to and I wouldn't have it any other way!

### Final Profession of Br Luan Ha OMI

## Perpetual Oblation of the First Oblate from Hong Kong

Responding to the Call for the Poor

The Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate (OMI) has been in Hong Kong for 55 years since 1966 to evangelize and to serve the poor and the most abandoned. The first Oblate from Hong Kong has just professed his perpetual oblation responding to this call for the poor.

On September 8, 2021, the OMI celebrated the birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary with this perpetual oblation in the Notre Dame Parish, To Kwa Wan, Hong Kong. Fr. Slawomir Kalisz, OMI (Fr. Slawek), China Delegation Superior, presided over the Eucharistic celebration, concelebrated with our Oblates and Cardinal Joseph Zen (bishop emeritus of Hong Kong).

In the perpetual oblation Fr. Slawek assessed Br. Dominic King Ho Fung, OMI whether he can love Jesus Christ with all his heart like the Blessed Virgin. Br. Dominic promised to love Christ wholeheartedly and to follow the examples of our founder St. Eugene de Mazenod to love God and his neighbours in his life.

Every Oblate professing perpetual oblation can receive a new Cross or inherit from deceased Oblates. Br. Dominic has been the Pastoral Assistant in the Oblate Primary School Hong Kong (OPS), so he chose to carry the Cross of the former school supervisor Fr. Stanislaus Sun, OMI. Receiving the Cross of Fr. Sun signifies the inheritance of his spirit of love for the youth and the poor.

In his thanksgiving message, Br. Dominic gave a flower to his parents and thanked them for the cultivation of faith.

Now 34 years old, several times Br. Dominic has participated in OMI Vocation Weekend during secondary school. In 2006 he joined the Oblate Youth. Meanwhile, he was discerning his vocation living in prayer life with vocation groups of the Hong Kong Diocese. He studied abroad after secondary school, then became the Pastoral Assistant in OPS. He joined the Oblates in 2014, professed his first vows in the Philippines in 2016, and finished his Philosophy and Theology studies this year. From this Summer he serves in St. Alfred's Parish, Hong Kong as he continues his formation becoming a priest.

Receiving the perpetual oblation of the first Oblate from Hong Kong, Fr. Slawek said: "I am wonderfully happy today. We have waited for 55 years, and today we have the first fruit from Hong Kong... We form Oblates by accompanying them to love God and neighbours, especially the poor; and my way is to be with them, to take care of people in need in parishes and on the streets."

This spirit of service and accompaniment has deeply touched Br. Dominic as he said: "Oblates always love to stay with the poor and the youth, I agree very much with this spirit and vocation." Br. Dominic has served in mountain areas in the Philippines, and this experience confirms what he has learned: "We as Christians should learn from the poor because God likes to show us the spirit of the Gospel through them."



#### **INDONESIA**

#### CHRISTMAS IN ST. STEPHENS PARISH – CILACAP

We were graced to be able to celebrate Christmas again with parishioners celebrating in person and online, but still in line with the health protocols stipulated by the government and increasing the number of masses celebrated.



In the town, we held two vigil masses and two Christmas morning masses with around 350 parishioners at each mass and around 2,000 followed the masses from live streaming.

Fr. Petrus, O.M.I. went to the sea villages with a group of parishioners from Cilacap and had full churches as these areas are isolated and free from Covid 19. I celebrated Christmas in the local jail where Catholic and Protestants joined together for the celebration, and



we have permission from the local bishops to invite all to receive Communion. Also, the Masses in the main Church.

Fr. Petrus celebrated a special children's mass in the main Church with "entertainment" after the mass.

We had a police presence from Dec 23rd to Jan 2nd as there is still some danger of extremists interfering with Christian celebrations and we provided a special tent and meals for the officers guarding the churches.

On a national level – the president of Indonesia – Joko Widodo – attended celebrations for Christmas in a very large and packed sports stadium and gave a very positive talk to all present. Many Ministers and past presidents attended the ceremonies. There is a big effort for the unity of all.

Fr. Petrus brightened up the presbytery with a Christmas tree, lights, etc. and we had 8 seminarians – 6 O.M.I.'s and 2 Diocesan with us for Christmas, and they prepared the priest visit at the outstations.

The parishioners prepared for Christmas with a penitential Liturgy – in person and online with general absolution but also an opportunity for private confession if asked for.

Christmas was a happy time and health protocols did not dampen the spirit of Cooperation and community which Christmas lit up in the hearts of men of goodwill and we thank God for graces received and Love shared and we thank again M.A.M.I. Australia for so generous help to us and our people.

#### AROUND THE MISSION

#### **KENYA** Getting Stronger

Although politics is getting complicated heading to elections in August 2022, the country is peaceful and slowly increasing the number of jobs available. In northern parts, people are suffering drought, while the whole country is wondering why the wet season is so dry. This will be a big problem for food supplies in the coming months. Security is a little bit concerning at present, with so many people still struggling to get by. I no longer travel at night, and we use taxis for airport runs.

The Oblates are still alive and kicking. And our Kenya Mission numbers just increased with four scholastics returning from Cedara, South Africa: a pastoral year for three and (God willing), a 2022 ordination for the fourth man. This is very encouraging for us. In August two more Pre-Novices from Namibia joined our Karen Pre-Novitiate; we now have 9 Pre-Novices: four (Namibia) and five (Kenya).

November was a busy time A new planning committee was formed for the 25th Anniversary of the Oblates in Kenya to be celebrated in May 2022.

The Oblate youth group in Nairobi continued quietly but visited a small Children's Home in July. The Oblate youth chipped in with a donor from Australia to send money and buy footwear for the children to stop them getting infected with "jiggers" (worms), that burrow into the skin - they don't feel it until it's too late due to the thick "padding" under the feet (walking barefoot for years). Oblate youth are planning to visit on a regular schedule to give encouraging talks and open up their minds to new possibilities. Parents at this place are, generally, not interested in education for their children. Fr Fidele continues Prison Ministry at the women's maximum prison and Fr Gerard continued Chaplaincy at Nyumbani HIV+ children's home.

In June, the Oblates in Meru held a Child Protection awareness seminar attracting people from the Education and Government sectors as well as local Catechists, Parish Leaders, youth, and parishioners. It was successful and we plan more in the future. There is still a great ignorance in the general population about the harm caused by child abuse.

We still have three student priests from Lesotho, Zambia, and DR Congo. Fr Gerard is now part of a special Liaison Committee to help improve working relationships between the Religious and Diocesan Clergy around Kenya. Projects around the Kenya Mission continued:

- Our Mission Centre at Karen storehouse started in September and progressing slowly, slowly. Fr Fidel continues with the landscaping around the new residence.
- At Rongai, we've now waited 7 months for a 3-phase meter: a shortage caused by corruption in the power company and a change of leadership.
- 3. In Kionyo parish our new church continues with internal furnishings and finishes to prepare for the 25th Anniversary in May 2022



 At Irinda parish (Meru town) the new borehole was drilled successfully. Church planning continues – adjusting to budget constraints.

### **PAKISTAN** Thank you from Mazenod College, Lahore, Pakistan.

Youhanabad, Lahore, is the largest Christian settlement in Pakistan and was established around 46 years back. Youhanabad is surrounded by 16 different colonies with approximately one million residents including Muslims and Christians. The educational system among all these settlements is awful. Youth do not have quality education or skills. They are unaware of their future and living life without any purpose. The Church has established a few schools, but they are also not sufficient. The government opened a few schools in different areas, but they are also up to primary, middle, and high school education. For college and university education students must travel to the main city which is beyond the capacity of the majority. The lack of colleges and university education has left the youth, especially the Christian population with minimum opportunities for a brighter future.



To meet the big need for education the Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate Delegation Pakistan got approval from the Secretariat of Rome to build a college for this population. The Mission Procure Germany sponsored the full cost of construction of Mazenod College. Within two years, we have completed the college construction and the building is ready now for the admissions of students.

With the help of the Australian Province and MAMI, we were able to purchase furniture and equipment for the staff as well as for classrooms. We thank the Australian MAMI for their continued generous help and support to our Mazenod College, Lahore, Pakistan.

The community hall is built and half of the Oblate residence is also complete. Already Oblates are staying in completed rooms. Now church work is going on. We aim to complete it by end of April 2022. The fund from Australia will be used for the completion of the church.

Once again, I thank you all. I offer holy masses for your intentions. May the good Lord allow you to continue to do this kind of favour to the poor of the world.

#### Friend on the Street - Queensland Rosies

The early months of the year often bring a sense of hope and excitement for what the new year will have in store for us. This year, however, feels a little different. We have experienced a surge in the number of cases of COVID-19, with many volunteers in isolation, employed as carers, classed as essential workers or vulnerable themselves, our outreaches were greatly affected. It seemed dire – many local businesses were unable to open because staff were sick, supply chain interruption meant a lack of essential items, and people began to get nervous. Was this 2020 all over again?

It has been a stressful time for all but more so for those who rely on Rosies for a cuppa and chat each week. This might be the only meaningful interaction they have – what would happen if there was no one there to ask, "Hey mate or hello friend, how are you?"

With this thought in mind, we put a call out for new volunteers and where possible asked existing volunteers to put their hand up for an extra shift or two if they had space to help Rosies stay present for our patrons. We were overwhelmed with responses from individuals and teams wanting to know how they could do more to support our mission.

New volunteers poured in from across the state to lend a hand, share friendship, and ensure that no patron felt alone or afraid that they wouldn't be able to grab a snack and engage in simple conversation. Our people, Rosies people, continued to show up for those in need; to show that even though we may have our faces covered and we are standing 1.5m apart, I am still here for you, I care for you and care about what happens to you.

It is times like these when we witness the generosity of spirit that our volunteers carry with them every day that we are reminded of a line in Galatians chapter 6, verse 9: "Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up". At a time when it would have been so easy for our volunteers to grow weary of doing good many decided to put their hands up and do more and encourage their friends and family to join them in doing "more." Those volunteers picked up this mantle and carried it aloft ensuring that the risk of a cancelled outreach grew smaller and smaller as restrictions continue to change.

The Rosies volunteers' commitment to service has been humbling to witness over the last two years during COVID — but it has been even more apparent over the last several weeks. When it would have been so easy for many of our volunteers to take a step back and look after their own needs, they stepped up and put the wellbeing of our patrons first. They have continued to sew faith, friendship, and connection so that our patrons may reap the love and community that flourishes on outreach.
